

Publishing *Arbitrating for Peace*

Call for Submissions

The Arbitration Institute of the Stockholm Chamber of Commerce (SCC) will turn 100 years in 2017. As part of the centennial celebration, the SCC is planning to issue a book titled *Arbitrating for Peace*, a publication devoted to international arbitration as a peaceful form of dispute resolution.

The idea behind the book

The purpose of the book is to focus on the geopolitical role played by international arbitration over the centuries, and how international arbitration has made a difference. It is meant to lead by example, and demonstrate how the dynamics of international law in general and international arbitration in particular, have contributed to peace and prosperity on both the regional and the global level.

The idea is to contribute to the debate on a continued dynamic development of dispute resolution in complicated or sensitive geopolitical contexts, by highlighting some landmark cases and to illustrate how arbitration played an important role in resolving these disputes and may continue to play this role in the future.

The book will contain thirteen chapters (tentative), each devoted to a landmark international arbitration case, primarily state-to-state, but also including commercial disputes with geopolitical dimensions. Each chapter will be written by a different author; all with a strong background in international law and arbitration.

The intention is that the articles should convey to the reader not only the legal basis of the case but also a sense of the atmosphere and specifics surrounding the case, including the geopolitical setting. In this way, *Arbitrating for Peace* will become not only a legal textbook, but also a description of international arbitration's place in the history of relations between states.

One chapter will be written by the winner of a competition, which is hereby announced.

Substantive scope

The paper should address an arbitral award other than any of the cases presented in the attached tentative Table of Content. Preferably, contributions should not focus exclusively on the legal aspects of the case, and observations on the wider geopolitical context are encouraged, in line with the general idea behind the book.

Form

The submission must not exceed 6,000 words.

Eligibility

This competition is primarily targeting law students or lawyers with up to five years of practical experience.
